FLUSHING, (UPI)—The western powers agreed yesterday to put their Soviet-vetted demand for Chinese Communists withdrawal from Korea before the Security Council Thursday by United Nations General Assembly without delay.

The resolution will go no further toward countering Peking's aggression than did the six-power proposal voted in the Security Council Thursday by Russia, France, U. S., Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

A Moscow spokesman said:

"All American spokesmen and it will repeat assurances to Mao Tse-tung that his country's broader interests will be respected and will confirm that current UN policy rules out UN military action across the Manchurian border, but it will warn that this may be lifted swiftly if the Chinese Communists defy the

Chinese Call War All-Out Struggle

HONG KONG, Sunday (UPI)—The Chinese Communists termed the Korean war an all-out "life and death struggle" yesterday and called for nationwide military training of all youths between 17 and 28.

The nationwide call to arms appeared to shatter any hopes that the Communists would withdraw voluntarily from Korea. Peking added that the United Nations forces never would withdraw from Korea until they are soundly defeated.

Peking Radio broadcast an editorial from the official Communist organ, the Peking Peoples Daily News, which said the Chinese were not afraid of atomic bombs or American air-bombing.

Many Wounded Yanks Burned Alive By Chinese

NORTHEAST FRONT, Korea (UPI)—Survivors of a Communist ambush said yesterday that fanatical Chinese burned wounded American prisoners alive and danced around the flames "like wild Indians," while the GIs screamed in pain.

Other men of the U. S. 3rd Infantry Division said the Chinese threw some wounded soldiers onto a highway and ran over them with bulldozers, bayoneted others in the face and machine-gunned their flag of truce when they tried to surrender.

The 3d Division men made a hasty retreat down the east side of Chosin Reservoir in northeast Korea to Hungnam on the Southern tip. From there, the Marines and Air Force pilots probably the greatest mass flight in history flew 1,000 wounded to rear area hospitals.

One of the three survivors with whom I talked was Pfc. Herman Butler, 2d Lt. of Company D, of the 3d Division. He said his group had been attacked about mid-morning yesterday and had to retreat to the rear. They had been

Chinese Hordes Swarm Through Central Korea

TOKYO, Sunday, (UPI)—Outnumbered and battle-weary United Nations forces began an orderly evacuation of Pyongyang today as the enemy drove down central Korea and threatened to trap the solid UN army against both the east and west roads. A Communist guerrilla mortar attack on the outskirts of the former enemy capital coincided with mounting underground activity inside the city. A U. S. spokesman said about 6,000 armed underground members in Pyongyang were expected to make a concerted move "at any time." Around the allied defense perimeter north and northeast of Pyongyang the UN forces, braced for a new Communist assault, "Dunkerque" Readied.
