Troy Man Missing In Action

Anxiously waiting for word from her son Pvt. Francis Dunn, who was reported slightly wounded in action in Korea in July 16, Mrs. Katherine Dunn of 22 Mechanic Street, yesterday received a telegram from the Adjutant General of the Army stating that her boy had been missing in combat since the July date. Mrs. Dunn received a telegram from the Army Nov. 10 that her son was wounded, but it did not mention at what hospital he was stationed.

Now, approximately six months after his reported injury, Mrs. Dunn has received word that he was missing.

The local youth, as the mother stated had been in the habit of writing home at least three times a week

From July 15 Mrs. Dunn had not received a letter from her son. The first correspondence from the battle area was from the Army reporting that he was wounded. The BECONG," the "one" whe "received Wednesday, stated that he was missing in action.

The 21-year-old soldier entisted in the U.S. Army in August, 1948, and after receiving bis basic training, was assigned to the 24th Division. It was with the 24th Division that he saw combat in Korca.
